

There were some great stories and those of us who are relatively new, myself included, learned more about the terrific people who have passed through Balboa Tennis Club over the years.

Three weeks ago I was up at the club and noticed that something was different. I pondered it for a minute and realized that people

were sitting on the planters. *Yahoo!* I knew we had succeeded.

The new plants are encouraging people to use the planters as seating, which was the original purpose.

This newsletter is full of very important information on future projects.

This is an exciting time to be a member of BTC. Our diversity is our biggest asset — everyone has a talent they can contribute to make BTC a better place.

BTC since 1924: What will your legacy be?

What is a Legacy? A Legacy is simply a gift. It is a way for a person to give back to the community in ways that sometimes outlive the giver. For example, our patio remodel was made possible in large part by a private donation. Our new patio will probably be here for us to enjoy for many years to come.

The mission of the BTC is to manage this tennis facility for the City of San Diego, and in a manner which will maintain affordability to the general public.

You would all probably agree that the fees here at the BTC are the lowest to be found anywhere in the area.

These low fees result in the necessity of operating BTC on a lean budget, leaving no ability to pay for substantial capital improvement projects, like lighting improvements, backboard upgrade, etc. The point is, major improvements need an influx of cash from outside sources. Cash donations can play a major part in making necessary major improvements happen.

The newly formed Legacy Committee is responsible for educating and encouraging the general public to make donations to the Balboa Tennis Club.

You no doubt noticed that the lights on courts 1 through 18 have been upgraded. This upgrade was made possible in large part by a private donation made in an individual's last will and testament. As mentioned earlier, the patio upgrade was also made

possible in large part, by a private donation.

The board of directors has shifted its attention to our next major improvement, to rebuild the practice wall. You may have already seen Stan Griffin's model of the proposed new practice wall.

It would be a great overall improvement to the BTC facility, and will be lighted. The board is in the early stages of obtaining bids and engineering designs for our new practice wall. After the practice wall, we also want to light the lower six courts, which will require a substantial expenditure of money.

So how can members of BTC help? There are many ways you can help. You can donate your time if you have specific expertise in critical fields. You can make cash donations, either during your lifetime or at your passing.

If you want to donate money during your lifetime, simply write a check to the "Balboa Tennis Club."

If it is more appropriate for you to postpone any bequest until after your death, you can designate the "Balboa Tennis Club" as a "beneficiary" on your bank account. You could make the BTC the beneficiary of your checking, savings, CD, annuity, IRA, life insurance, brokerage account, etc. In this way, you can assure a legacy to the BTC without compromising your financial welfare during your lifetime.

Can my gift be income tax deductible? Yes. Gifts


USPTA pros will give you tips and techniques to enhance your game whether you are a beginner

Tennis Tips...

...from the pros

Do you find yourself hitting your forehand late or being off balance when making contact with the ball?

If one or both of these occur more than you wish, you may not be using your non-dominant arm correctly during the swing.

Chances are that you're leaving your opposite arm dangling by your hip. To hit the forehand correctly, when you take your racket back, place your non-

dominant arm out in front of you towards the path of the incoming ball.

By doing this, you track the ball as it approaches you, which assists in hitting the tennis ball in front of your body.

Having your opposite arm in this position also helps maintain your balance, much in the same manner as it does for a gymnast on the balance beam.

By making sure you are in a proper, balanced position on the forehand, your power and consistency will be greatly improved.

Member Spotlight

65 years of Morley memories...

Do you consider yourself a long-time member of the Balboa Tennis Club? George Peterson has been playing tennis at Morley Field for over sixty years.

George was recently invited to sit down in the clubhouse and talk about his experiences with this place we now know as the Balboa Tennis Club.

"When I was thirteen years old my family moved into that house," George said, pointing out the window at a red tile roof on the corner of Mississippi and Upas. "That was 1938." There were only 10 courts at Morley Field then, located in the same spot where the front 10 courts stand today. George says the first five courts had steel nets and there were no net straps.

George told me there was the same walkway between courts 8 and 9, "but there was no concrete out there then, and it used to get all muddy when it rained."

George wasn't a tennis player when he arrived, but it wasn't long before he had the bug. His father bought him his first used tennis racquet for two dollars. He played tennis nearly every day until high school.

"In the afternoons there were usually three or four games going, maybe three on one end, one on the other." On Sundays the courts were full. "There were different groups on Sundays," George said. "A daybreak group, a 10 a.m. group, a 2 p.m. group – I played with all of them."

Once, at the age of 16, George stayed on the courts all day, playing a personal best 17 sets of tennis.

George played in the Harper Ink junior tournaments in '39 and '40, along with up to 400 other kids. "In those days there was no entry fee and we played with *two* balls. The kids who lost the tournament got to keep the two balls so they would have something to hit with."

George still remembers playing tennis on courts 9 and 10 on December 7, 1941 when the second world war started. "We all said in two weeks the war will be over. Two years later I was drafted," George mused.

George went to his physical hoping to enter the army, maybe see Europe.

After the exam the man looked at George and said, "How do you like the navy?" "I was standing there naked and I didn't feel like I was in any position to argue."

George served in the navy until 1946. After the war George played a lot of tennis. In 1948 the Reservations Building was constructed, and the pro shop and the clubhouse came not long after that. George worked in the pro shop for a while stringing and patching racquets.

In 1949 Wilbur Folsom came to Morley Field from University Heights. "Wilbur made tennis affordable," says George. "He had half hour lessons to kids for a dollar. Two kids were 50 cents each. Four kids could get a lesson for a quarter each."


That year the San Diego Tennis Club was created, and George was its third President. Ben Press was the champion of the San Diego Tennis Club. In 1952 the Tennis Patrons of San Diego started and everyone from the San Diego Tennis Club joined the Patrons. The Patrons took over all the tournaments from the City of San Diego's Park Department.

What we now know as the District Championships was then called the San Diego County Championships run by the Balboa Tennis Club in its old location by the zoo.

The Balboa Tennis Club took over operation of Morley Field in the 60's when the zoo needed their courts to expand their parking lot.

These days hip and ankle injuries keep George off the courts, and he isn't around as much since he moved to El Cajon to be closer to his large family.

Still, it isn't unusual to find George on the bench outside court 9 (there's never any mud there now) watching people play tennis. Why not? He's been watching from that spot for 65 years now.



SDTF celebrates 20th anniversary with 2003 San Diego Open

This year marks the San Diego Tennis Federation's (SDTF) twentieth anniversary with celebrations culminating this July during the 18th annual San Diego Open. The SDTF's growing membership of more than 220 men and women ranges in abilities from "novice" to "open" player levels.

The club was founded as a gay tennis club in 1983 by the SDTF's first president, Jim Winters, along with other current members: Joe Arnold, George Hamilton, Marco Ruiz.

Jim started the singles ladder and also organized the first team tennis season, which now is the SDTF's most popular activity.

"For the past two decades, we have provided a friendly environment for tennis enthusiasts to compete and socialize through a number of activities, including tournaments, practice sessions, social events and meetings," said Allen Sanchez, vice president of the SDTF. "Our club is as competitive or as social as each member makes it."

With Balboa Tennis Club as the SDTF's "home court," the group provides its members several opportunities a week to play or practice tennis in an

organized and fun environment.

As a member of the Gay and Lesbian Tennis Alliance (GLTA) and United States Tennis Association (USTA), Federation members participate in a variety of tournaments sanctioned or sponsored by these organizations throughout the state, country and even internationally.

The SDTF puts on the San Diego Open, one of the largest tennis tournaments of its kind and one of the most successful national tournaments on the GLTA circuit.

This year's San Diego Open will be held in part at Balboa Tennis Club on Friday, July 4 through Sunday, July 6, and includes divisions in Open, A, B, C, D, and Over 45 Singles and Doubles. A banquet held at Balboa Park's Aerospace Museum will celebrate the tournament on the evening of July 5th and feature museum tours, special raffles and a multi-media presentation covering the history of the SDTF.

that need to be made income tax deductible need to be given to the "Greater San Diego City Tennis Counsel, for the benefit of the Balboa Tennis Club."

The Greater San Diego City Tennis Counsel ("Counsel") is a 501(c)(3) organization, which will allow you to deduct your gift on your income tax return. The Counsel will forward your gift directly to the BTC. Any of these gifts can also be gift and estate tax deductible if channeled through the Counsel.

Can I gift stock to the BTC? Yes. Gifting stock is also a popular method of gifting for charitable purposes. If you sell the stock and pay the capital gain and then gift the remaining cash, then your gift has been reduced by the capital gain taxes that you paid.

If you gift the stock, without selling them first, then no taxes will be paid to the IRS. For income tax reasons, however, the gift must be made to the Counsel as designated above. With the gift channeled through the Counsel, neither the giver, you, or the receiver, the BTC, pay the capital gain taxes on the ultimate sale of the stock.

If you have a living trust and you wish to leave a legacy in your trust, you will need to meet with your estate planning attorney to make the appropriate changes. Estate planning attorneys can also discuss other methods of charitable giving that are too complicated for you to do on your own, such as creating a Charitable Remainder Trust or Charitable Lead Trust.
