


The End of an Era

Federation Brings Home the CAL CUP

The San Diego Tennis Federation, SDTF or sometimes just called *the* Federation by many long time Balboa Tennis Club members, has been a growing contingent of players at BTC for almost 25 years now. Formed in early 1983 by Jim Winters with 8 original players, the Federation was a group of gay tennis players who came together to start a league for the purposes of promoting tennis in the San Diego gay community. The league quickly grew to over 25 players by 1984; and reached 100 players in 1990 and recently boasts about 230 players. A majority of the

Federation members who have memberships or play regularly at Balboa have become an important element of the BTC culture.

In 1985, the relatively small San Diego Tennis Federation proposed a three-team match competition between San Diego, the wellestablished Los Angeles Tennis Association (LATA) and Gay Tennis Federation (GTF) of San Francisco. The match would feature the top 24 gay players in each city and the winner each year would win the coveted Cal Cup trophy and bragging rights the Best in the West

OLP Tennis Practice at Balboa

If you play tennis in the afternoon at BTC, you've probably noticed the groups of girls who are competing on the lower courts. They are students from Our Lady of Peace High School, which is located on Oregon Street overlooking Mission Valley. This venerable institution is celebrating their 125th year of existence. The school is run by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet, and in particular, Sister Delores for the past 30 years. There aren't any tennis facilities at OLP, so the teams play their matches and practice at BTC.

Coach and BTC member Darice Carnaje has been guiding the tennis program for the past 12 years. In addition to her own playing and teaching, Darice spends endless hours preparing the girls for league competiton. Right now the team owns a 5-4 conference record and they are 7-10 overall for 2007. The Western League Tournament, which is a highlight of their season, runs November 5-7.

Doubles Tennis Tip From OLP Coach Darice Carnaje

When serving, try to put your partner where you think the return of serve is going to go. The more time the server's partner gets to touch the ball, or the receiver is forced to change shots in order to avoid the server's partner, the better the chances of holding serve. If the receiver is lobbing, the server's partner should be back near the service line to take

away the lob. If the receiver tends to hit mostly crosscourt, some form of poaching will be needed. Increasingly, *I-formation* is becoming popular, where the server's partner crouches halfway between guarding either the crosscourt or down-the line return. This strategy is very effective because the server's partner clearly cannot stay in the middle of the court, forcing the receiver to have to guess where the opening is going to be. The server's partner needs to decide where he

thinks the receiver will most likely wish to return the serve, then wait as long as possible before shifting to cut off the return so that the receiver must completely commit to a shot. In a more advanced setting, there is a signal telling which way the server's partner is going to go, and a signal to tell the server to either serve to the receiver's forehand or backhand. This is important because it may be easier to predict where a receiver may hit the forehand or the backhand, giving the server's partner even more of an edge in choosing which shot to guard.



among gay tennis players. That first match was played at the River Valley Tennis Club in October of 1986, and San Diego shocked its neighbors to the north by winning that inaugural "California Cup" match by a wide margin.

In the late 1980's SDTF continued to become a force in gay tennis. After its 1986 *coming out*, SDTF won 3 of the first 4 "Cal Cups", as the competition rotated host sites between San Diego, San Francisco and Los Angeles. San Diego also set new standards on

wanted to combine the best of the knowledge and experience that the SDTF veterans had amassed, with the best of the youth movement that has brought us some great new players in the last year. But going into the competition, Los Angeles had dominated the Cal Cup in 7 of the last 9 years and were overwhelming favorites to win again.

After 12 weeks of practices and team meetings led by captains and coaches Mimi Loucks, Matt Coin and Vince Riveroll, the San Diego players were ready to

the gay tennis circuit with their *San Diego Open* tournament, first played at Morley Field in February 1986. Players from around the country flocked to San Diego each year for its new San Diego Open tournament that now is in its 24th year. Soon after this, SDTF helped formed the first Gay and Lesbian Tennis Alliance (GLTA) which is now a circuit of tournaments around the world.

Those were the hey days of gay tennis in San Diego - and the Federation won its last California Cup in 1989. For 18 years, SDTF has fielded teams to compete against San Francisco and LA, but fell short year after year to the much larger clubs to the north. With the competition coming back to San Diego this year, the team brought out its old timers, Jim Winters and Scott Williford, as captains, to try to bringback the Cup that had eluded them for 18 years.

Jim and Scott, as well as BTC's Brad Hasper, had played on those early winning teams in the 1980's. In fact, Brad Hasper is now the only player to have played all 22 years of the competition. Jim and Scott certainly give it their best shot. The match took place Oct 6-7 at Barnes Tennis Center, with all the singles matches being played on Saturday and all doubles on Sunday. Early on Saturday, San Diego got off to a great start winning its first 6 matches. San Diego's #1 player, Matt Coin got it started with a huge upset win over San Francisco's top player, Curtis Dunn, who had not lost a match in 6 years of this competition. The team used that momentum to hold off a talented Los Angeles team, who came back twice on the final day to tie it and actually take a 1-match lead at one point on Sunday. But

the spirited SDTF club cheered its teammates on with some high-decibel energy throughout the day. In the end, it was the teamwork and player-to-player support that was the difference, as it came down to the last two San Diego matches on the court late Sunday afternoon. San Diego swept both matches to close out the win 29, to LA's 27, to SF's 16. A raucous celebration not normally seen on the tennis courts followed as players realized they had broken the 18-year drought, and captured back the Cup that started here 22 years ago.

Normally the club votes one inspirational player as *MVP*, among those that had won all three of their matches (1 singles and 2 doubles). But this year the team decided to name the TEAM as MVP because of the amazing team support that was really the difference in this match. Nevertheless, 8 players did win three matches and many fought through injuries to bring the Cup home - Matt Coin, Kyle Wagner, Jamie Saben, Mike Rodrigues, Eugene Berg, Jeremy Marble, Spencer Sam and Seth Makechnie. Congratulations to TEAM SDTF and the history making win!

Fran Wakefield is retiring from Tournament Desk Coordinator after 18 years of service at Balboa Tennis Club. She has enjoyed her position, yet she feels it's time to pass the torch to someone else. Carole Bunker has agreed to take over the duties for 2008.

When Fran first arrived in San Diego from Northridge in 1988, she wanted to play in a BTC

Tournament. She met a nice group of ladies to play with and a partner for the tournament. Fran ended up winning her division the first year. While competing, she became acquainted with Tournament Director Geoff Griffin. They've worked in tandem for the last 18 years.

"Back in those days, Wilson Charts were used and each name was hand written," Fran said. Since the inception of computerized tournament formats, the process has been improved

yet still requires an organized tournament desk. This is where Fran's expertise and knowledge has been so valuable.

"I like to know that if I walk away, the tournament will run by itself," Fran says. This is key in her mind. She likes to know that she has done a good job of organizing the desk and all the volunteers involved.

One of the challenges of working at the desk involves dealing with all types of personalities. "I try to be as nice as I can to the players," she says. "I want the players to enjoy the tournament." Occasionally, she'll encounter a player who gets upset at the desk because his or her name is mispronounced or is nervous about the tournament and takes their

frustration out on the desk workers. If there is a major problem, the tournament director and referee will step in and diffuse the situation.

With her own experience as a competitor, Fran understands the needs of tournament players. She tries to make sure the more competitive matches are featured on the show courts. In dealing with players

> who are new to the game or are playing their first tournament, Fran walks them through the procedures of check in and what to do at the conclusion of a match. She will even try to arrange for shady courts, when moms, babies or grandma's may require special circumstances. "I try to make the tournament good for everybody."


> Most important, Fran really enjoys giving back to the game. "If I'm benefitting from playing tournaments, I feel like I should give back to the game." Hopefully, this altruistic example

will encourage others to get involved. Fran is encouraged by the new faces who have recently offered to help at the desk. Improvements she would like to see for 2008 are name tags for the desk volunteers and more male representation at the desk.

"It's fun to be in a position where you're meeting people," she says. Hopefully, this spirit of giving will last beyond the Christmas season at BTC.
